Forward

This Activities Guide for 2019 is intended to provide basic information on contacts, facilities and programmes that are provided for Surrey Scouts by Surrey Scouts and others. Some activities can also be adapted for the younger sections. These are indicated by the section logo.

The Activity Clubs within Surrey Scouts are constituted to enable members of the Scout movement to enjoy specific activities in safety with appropriate supervision, viz., air activities, caving, mountaineering, radio, shooting, water activities. These clubs organise a variety of events and meetings, from open evening meetings and “taster days”, to more advanced Club events & instruction.

Many events are affected by external agencies and will be fixed at later dates e.g. flying and shooting or they may be subject to change.

Key Factsheets are included for most activities; a complete list and other resource materials, is available from the website: www.scouts.org.uk or the Information Centre at Gilwell.

Check-lists for all activities, of issues to be considered are given on page 5.

The Adventurous Activities Permit Scheme is intended to ensure the safety of young people undertaking the activities. Also, that those in charge are competent and appropriate to lead. The scheme is described in factsheets FS120100 to FS120104. Permits are only required for activities such as caving, hill walking, climbing & abseiling and water activities. Applications for permits should be made on the form relevant to the activity concerned, these are available on www.scouts.org.uk on the Activity pages. The completed form should be submitted to an assessor for the activity required. The assessor will be able to assess technical competence, using national governing body evidence or acquired experience where appropriate. The form should then be passed to a commissioner, e.g. District Commissioner, who will issue a permit. A similar scheme operates for Nights-Away experiences and is described in factsheet FS120800.

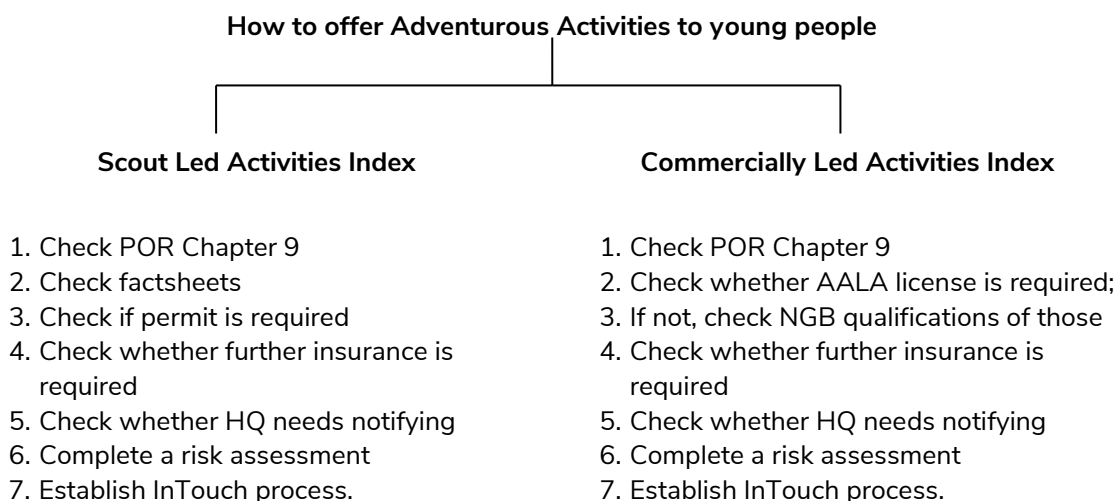

Offering Adventurous Activities

There are many activities that can be provided properly and safely by leaders using their scout leader training and imagination. Adventurous activities (e.g. Caving, Mountaineering and Water) and some others e.g. air activities and shooting, need specialist skills and it is necessary for leaders to carefully consider the process for safety and responsibility



Notes

1. POR (Policy, Organisation and Rules) is the Scout Associations formal rule book and is available either via the scout website. Chapter 9 deals with activities
2. A wide variety of factsheets, are available to help with the details of most activities.
 - a. Many activity centres etc. are required to be licensed under the Adventurous Activity Licensing Regulations. They will display their licence on literature or on request.
 - b. Instructors may be required to have National Governing body qualifications, e.g. mountain leader (ML), British Canoe Union (BCU) or Royal Yachting Association (RYA) instructor's certificates.
 - c. If any clause in the contract that a professional provider asks you to sign contains an indemnity clause that affects their responsibility, check that it is satisfactory with the HQ Legal or Activities sections.

InTouch

Whenever any activity or event is run within Scouting it is a requirement that an InTouch system is in place.

This is to ensure that:

- everyone involved is aware of how communication will take place between Leaders, participants and those not on the event,
- there are details of who is present should anything go wrong, and there is a system in place in the event of an emergency.

The procedures put in place to ensure this are likely to vary at different types of events due to the differing circumstances and needs. To facilitate InTouch; a factsheet [FS120075](#) outlines the process to ensure that everyone involved is aware of how communication will take place, between Leaders, participants and those not on the event.

Risk Assessments

- Step 1** Look for the hazards
- Step 2** Decide who might be harmed
- Step 3** Identify the precautions and set in place appropriate control measures
- Step 4** Consider contingencies
- Step 5** Review your assessment and revise if necessary

Flying Club

Surrey Scouts have some of the best scouting opportunities in the country to experience and learn about many aspects of flying. The Surrey Scout Flying Club offers Air Experience Flying, Microlight Flying, Gliding and badge course support for Scouts, Explorers, Scout Network and Leaders.

Gliding

EXPLORERS network

Gliding operations are planned at Lasham (Hants) and at RAF Kenley (Surrey). They are intended for Scouts of 14 years and above (Explorers and Network) and are suitable for groups of up to and including 10 people. Lasham flights can be organised for mid-week, day time. RAF Kenley flights, during May to July and September, can be arranged Monday to Thursdays from 6 to 8.30 pm.

Badge Courses

Paragliding opportunities run between March and October. For further details, information pack and booking forms - contact the bookings secretary.

- Basic Courses - Day courses are run for scouts of 10½ years and above giving each three flights for groups of up to 16 people. A non-returnable deposit is required to book.
- Parascenders Badge Course (for scout age) – This can be arranged subject to demand (maximum 8 scouts per course). This involves one evening, plus a complete day and will include 4 flights.
- Wings Flying Course - for those who have been on at least one basic course and be 16 years old or over. These comprise of a whole weekend training /camp and can be arranged if there enough applicants. They include 8-10 flights and there is a limit of 10 pilots to a course.
- Special Events, e.g. jamborees etc. can be arranged through our coordinator Nicola Sykes on highflying.nic@virgin.net

Note: operations can only commence / proceed if weather conditions are suitable, so courses sometimes have to be cancelled at short notice. In this event the Club will do their best to arrange another date as soon as possible.

It develops, teamwork and mutual support in difficult places, it also presents an opportunity to understand the fragile world underground and a need for conservation.

So where can we go Caving?

Within Surrey there is the opportunity for trips to the following mines and caves:

- Barons Cave and Tunnel Road Caves in Reigate – show mine/cave level exploration
- Godstone Main Series – easy caving with some stooping and crawling
- Merstham Mine – more adventurous caving with some flat-out crawling

Beyond Surrey, there is the opportunity for trips to any of the major UK caving regions (Mendip, South Wales, Peak District & Yorkshire), but except for the Mendips these will require an overnight stay. Advice can be given about suitable accommodation (both indoor and campsites) along with the availability, cost of instructors and equipment.

The Adventurous Activity Permit Scheme applies for caving activities; see the Forward to this booklet. Applications for permits to lead Scout parties into caves or mines, should be made on the relevant Adventurous Activity Permit form. Available from the Activity pages on www.scouts.org.uk. The completed forms should be sent direct to your chosen Assessor, who will also try to answer any queries. After an assessment has been completed the 'Responsible Commissioner' (normally your District Commissioner) will check the suitability of the candidate and issue a permit.

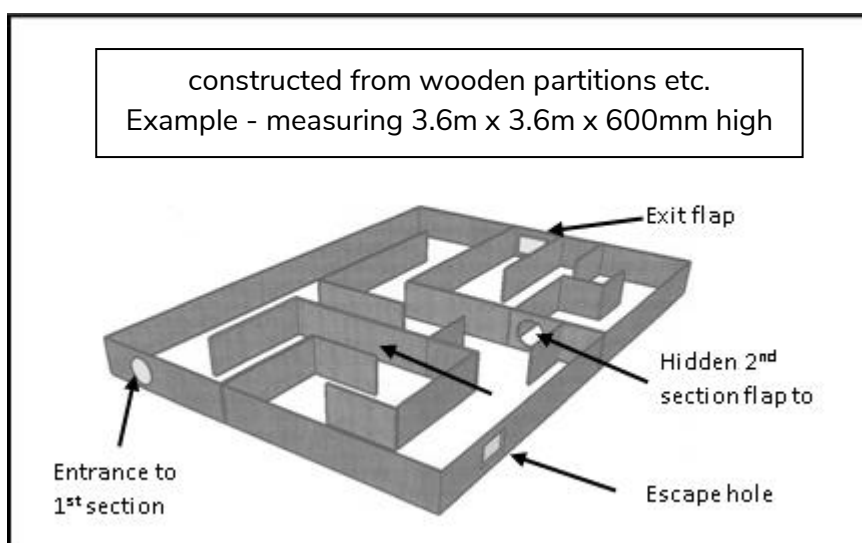

- **What and relevance to age group**

Caving is essentially exploring underground dark passages, caves, mines etc. For the very young this could be frightening.

How – Ideas - An introduction can be made by visiting a show cave. **An artificial cave** can be simulated by a construction from wooden partitions, benches, pipes, straw bales etc. and covering with blankets sheets or old tent canvas.

Possible maze covered by canvas



Useful tips – ensure no sharp edges or dangerous features.

Arranged adequate escape points, monitor safe access and exit

Supply torches and helmets.

BEAVERS cubs

- **What and relevance to age group**

Most young children love to climb and are often more nimble than older people once they gain a little confidence. However, some may be terrified of the unknown. The challenge is to encourage them to do it safely and not let their confidence exceed their ability. Especially appropriate activity for family camps or when parents are present

- **How – Ideas**

Try traversing round a low wall first

Abseil - lower from above with safety rope

- **Requirements and Restrictions**

Adventurous Activity Permit required for scout leading climbing and abseiling (POR Clause 9.34).

Ensure harness and helmets are appropriate in size. The smallest harness available may set the minimum child size allowed to climb.

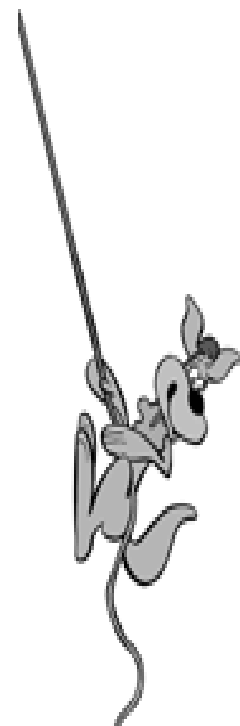
Purpose built walls on camp sites or at commercial climbing establishments

The scout programme facilitates a very close liaison with the Duke of Edinburgh Award. The most fruitful method of achieving the Explorer and Network Scout awards are by engaging in the DoE scheme and adding the few extra items thus:-

- Chief Scouts Platinum Award
= DoE Bronze + scout membership + 6 nights away + 2 activities;
- Chief Scouts Diamond Award
= DoE Silver + scout membership + 12 nights away + 2 further activities;
- Queens Scout Award
= DoE Gold + scout membership + 18 nights away + 2 further activities;

See the DoE webpage www.edofe.org and the Scout programme for further details.

The DoE Award may be achieved either

- Entirely through Surrey Scouts using the Scout Association as an operating authority.
- Entirely through an operating authority such as Surrey County Council via schools, colleges, other centres.
- Through a mixture of these.

To find out how to get started, consult the district's own DoE Advisers if one is in place or the county adviser Mark Taylor or county leader. The county advisor can supply resource materials, and the Welcome Pack. Mark will be pleased to visit any district and provide general advice.

Mountaineering Permits

The Adventurous Activity Permit Scheme applies to Hill Walking and Mountain Biking - see the Foreword to this booklet. Applications for permits should be made on the relevant Adventurous Activity Permit form. Available from the Activity pages on www.scouts.org.uk. The completed forms should be sent to the County Adviser for Mountain Activities (or to another hill walking assessor) and an assessment will be arranged. On completion of an assessment, the DC will check candidate's suitability and issue a permit.

Persons leading parties in Terrains One or Two (see definitions below) will require a formal permit. Terrain Zero does not require any formal permit though general expedition/activity requirements apply.

To gain or renew a permit an assessment is always required. This may be a paper exercise, or a practical assessment. For a new permit you will either need, to hold the relevant National Governing Body (NGB) Qualification or do a practical assessment. To renew a permit the assessment would normally be a paper exercise based on your logbook but a practical re-assessment could be required.

The relevant NGB Qualification depends on the terrain you wish to walk in. For Terrain 1, this is "Walking Group Leader (WGL)" and for Terrain 2, this is "Mountain Leader (ML)". Check with ACC (Activities) for possibilities of grant aid for all Leader Training Courses.

The following rough guide indicates that demanding hiking can be undertaken to suit all needs. Full definitions are given in POR (see rules 9.26 to 9.32).

Terrain Zero – Any area under 500 metres and within 30 minutes walk of a road or habitation. This applies to most of southern England.

Terrain One – Any area over 500 but under 800 metres high that can be accessed without any resort to scrambling and is within 3 hrs of a road or habitation. This terrain occurs on Dartmoor, Peak district and parts of Snowdonia, the Lake District and Scotland.

Terrain Two – Any area over 800 metres and/or that an element of scrambling may be required. This terrain applies to areas around the summits of several peaks in Snowdonia, Lake District and Scotland.

Winter Conditions – Any occasion when snow and/or ice conditions are present or can reasonably be expected and cannot easily be avoided. This not based on time of year.

Summer Conditions – Any occasion when Winter Conditions are not present. This not based on time of year.

Walking Group Size – Minimum 4 and maximum 7. There has been a proposal to change this rule – for the most recent information consult Scoutbase or the County Mountain Activities Adviser.

Skills courses (Mountain Skills and Remote Camping Skills) are run each year, that are suitable for people requiring an introduction to the activity and those wishing to develop their skills and/or prepare for formal assessment. They involve a day pre-meet held locally and a weekend in the hills, usually in Snowdonia. Assessment can normally be provided by prior arrangement.

Other Training and assessment courses

There are also opportunities available through the [Hampshire Scout Mountaineering Team](#) and other neighbouring Counties.

Some other opportunities are listed in Appendix 3 for mountaineering training with organisations offering courses that are suitable for Scouts and/or Leaders.

The seeds of hill walking and mountaineering can be sown in local countryside by walking and exploring with adults.

- **How – Ideas**

Explore neighbourhood with a purpose – e.g. find chip shop in country village

Bike exploration of a local park / heath

- **Requirements and Restrictions**

Particular attention should be paid to party size and keeping control of all individuals. No restrictions apply within Terrain 0, POR Clause 9.26 – 9.32, e.g. Surrey countryside

Carol can give advice on all aspects of orienteering. A **permanent orienteering course at Bentley Copse**, supported by British Orienteering, maps are available from the warden.

Equipment is available for loan, including control flags and punches, plus 1km of string on a reel (which can be used to provide a string course suitable for Beaver Scouts to follow, as an introduction to orienteering). There are also several permanent orienteering courses around the county, ideal for a troop or unit activity (see list below).

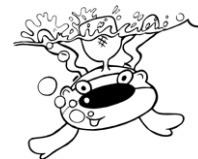
